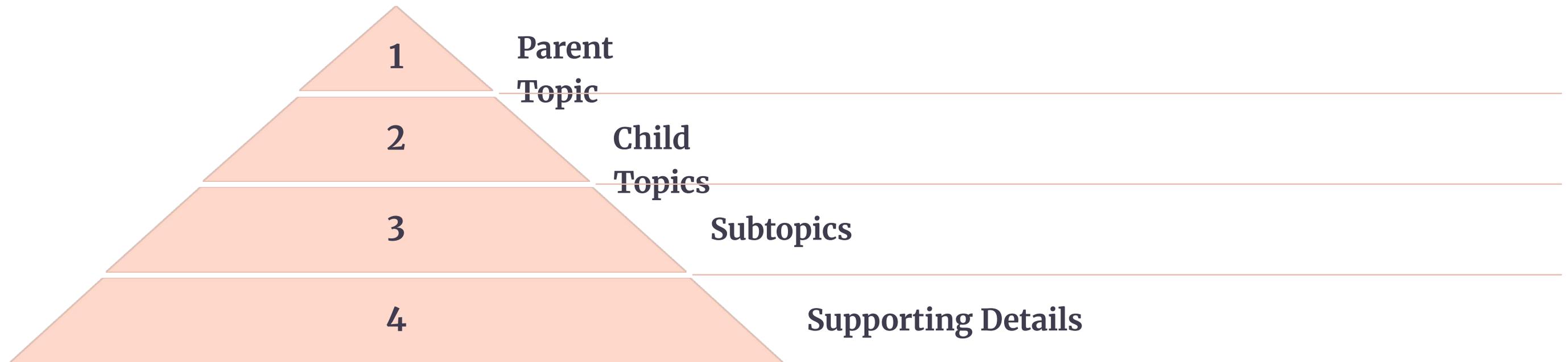

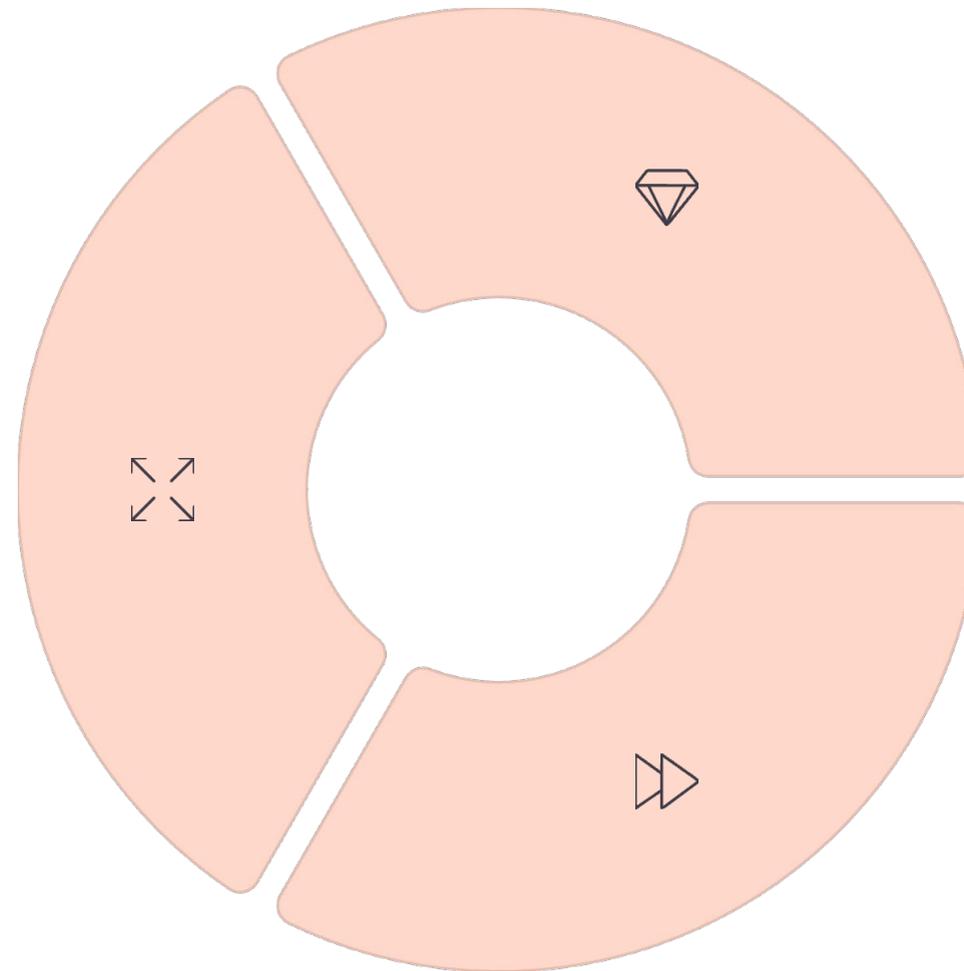
Technique 1: Build a Topical Map

Content Bloat

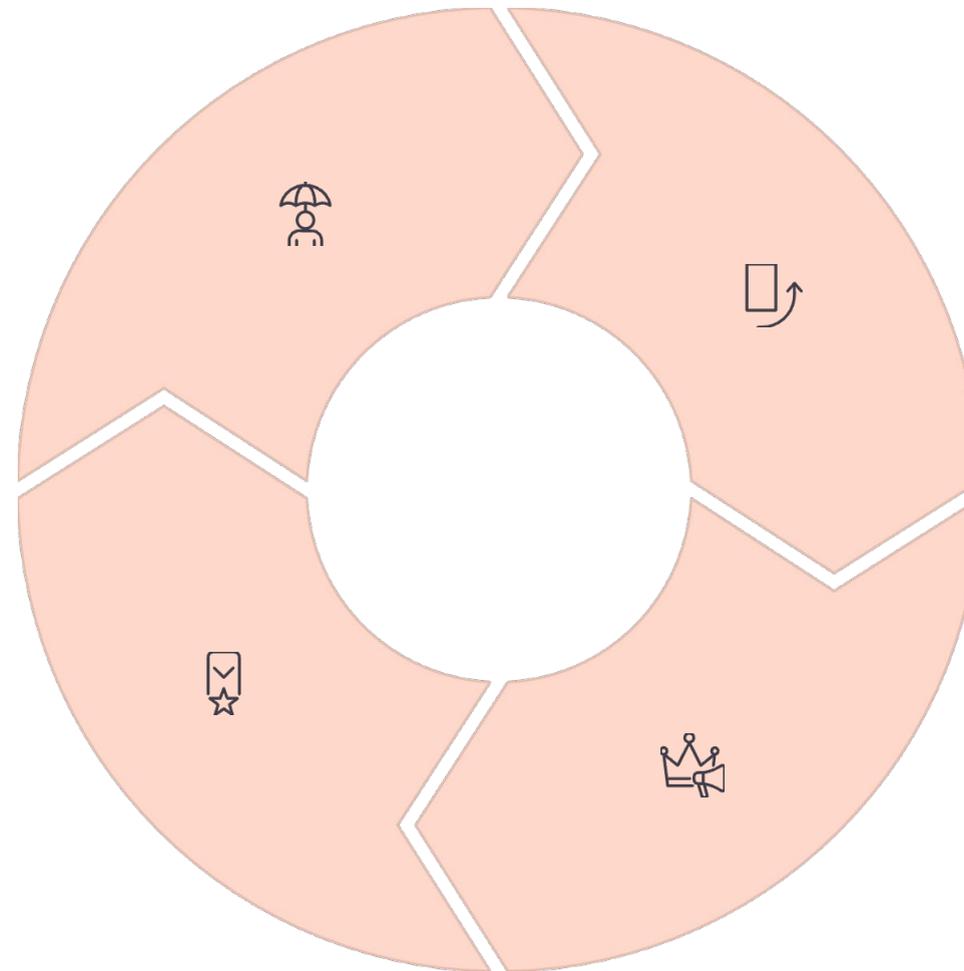

Create comprehensive briefs that map out all necessary coverage before writing begins.

Competitor Gap Analysis

Analyze top-ranking competitors to discover subtopics and entities they cover that you don't.

04

Query Research

Mine "People Also Ask," related searches, and query clustering tools for hidden intents.
